My Damascus Road Experience by Tanya*

Female—one beautiful aspect of His design, reflecting unity and diversity within the Trinity. This term was bestowed on me by our Creator before the foundation of the earth, yet I disconnected from it. Surviving an attempt on my life in the womb, I internalized being unwanted.

Early onset sexual objectification and social ostracizing made me believe being female wasn't a blessing, but a curse. At the age of eight, I stumbled upon my father's pornographic magazines. Confused and enticed by the images, I often snuck away to gaze at unrealistic expectations of womanhood. The innocence behind my need to be seen and known, and to connect relationally, became quite skewed. My identity and value shifted as I experienced molestation in my formative years. Guilt, shame, and condemnation followed. Suddenly neither men, nor family, were safe. Transgender desires and same-sex attractions arose, though my young mind lacked that terminology to express my feelings. Adverse family dynamics contributed greatly to escapism, and a woman's embrace offered me comfort and safety.

Pondering my life before Jesus, I had a deep sense of hopelessness that appeared everlasting, despite my family's ability to appear picture-perfect. Jesus entered my life as a child via a Gospel VHS tape hung on our door, then again at the age of seventeen in a country church tucked in southern Indiana. My father returned from rehab stating that he didn't understand, but we needed to go to church. All I knew of Christians were twisted intentions, hypocritical character and conduct, and my Machiavellian family members. By age fifteen, I believed I was born gay. Despite wrestling internally, I was saved and baptized in water and Holy Ghost, and grew a bit in biblical literacy. I declared I was going in gay and coming out straight prior to being baptized! If only my bold declaration and their Pentecostal shouts could've healed the heart wounds that led to my sin struggles. Jesus came to change our souls, not modify our behavior.

In university, I joined the Chi Alpha campus ministry, leading others to Jesus while continuing in my sin. Thankfully, despite my prodigal years, those individuals are all faithfully serving in ministry today. Becoming comfortable with cheating on Jesus, I was unwilling to fully surrender. I met a Christian man my age in a church I began attending, and without accountability, we quickly fell into sexual sin. I desired the protection that came from his touch, but not the repercussions we'd face if exposed. Eventually, I told his mother in an unconventional manner, and my prodigal season began with the label, "Jezebel".

Despite meeting a minister who left the LGBT lifestyle, I ran, rebelling against Christians who cared. Things became worse as I neglected Jesus and pursued a career instead. Missing biblical familial support and church community, I was running solo, finding community instead with witches and the

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LGBT crowd. I began to transition medically, legally, and socially in 2017, and after six months on hormones, I legally changed my name/gender marker. Subconsciously, I was becoming the man I needed: a protector, provider, and leader.

I encountered my first transgender man in university, who referred me to a counselor that advocated for those transitioning. Later, I met a woman who was several years into her transition. She appeared male physically, was

married to a woman, and seemed truly happy. While they became my close friends and cheered me on, I learned addiction and infidelity were tucked within their marriage as well, and a façade was lost. Many LGBT individuals I met appeared more compassionate and loyal than my biological family.


I can tell you, though, that changing all aspects of my life and body didn't appease the pain in my soul, the brokenness in my heart, the trauma of my past, or the torment within

my mind as I believed it would. Once that revelation happened, I felt stuck, but was still advocating, influencing others to transition. Promiscuity turned to modeling, which led to escorting, and finally sex slavery took my freedom as deceptive opportunities came forth from the world. To be honest, much of my testimony is my pursuit of supposed "freedom" via organized chaos, my rebellion. Had I trusted Jesus years prior and surrendered fully, much of my suffering could've been avoided.

Jesus freed me in 2021, via a Damascus road experience. The prayers of my spiritual parents led to that moment! I knew because many times, strangers would approach me to remind me of my call to ministry. Donna (a spiritual mother) confirmed this in 2024 as we reconciled with tears: "I love you, the Lord loves you, I want you to love you. I never stopped praying for you, even when I didn't want to. I was impressed that after all this time, you would return to this church. I want to pursue a relationship with boundaries, if that's okay?" Her words stunned me, the love in her embrace overwhelming, for it was her son I had sinned sexually with. Speechless, I nodded yes.

I was more amazed at Jesus, who had given me a dream of that exact moment months prior. In the dream, Donna stood in an illuminating white robe behind me, and the Holy Spirit spoke that deliverance, reconciliation, and inner healing will occur. I chuckled in disbelief when I awoke to write it down and texted the details to her pastor.

Believing my Damascus road experience wasn't Jesus, I went to my physician for blood work, thinking I'd been drugged. Then I saw a psychiatrist, trying to rationalize my experience as schizophrenia or cognitive dissonance. My tests returned normative. That encounter with the Holy Spirit had consumed me with His pure love, and reverential fear hit me immediately. I was shocked, relieved, and wanted to flee all at once. He didn't come as the dictator I expected;

In response, I sought legal counsel to deal with my escort handlers, signed NDAs, reconnected with ministers for help, ditched the witches/Satanists, and began to detransition. In solitude with Jesus, I shed TV/social media for nine months to dig into Scripture more. The comfort I sought via women was now found in the Holy Spirit's embrace, where He healed the heart wounds that led to my sin struggles. I regained my gender and name legally in 2023, with my spiritual parents, Todd & Kathy, standing with me. The judge scoffed, but my petition to the court stated, "I transitioned for my glory, but am de-transitioning for the glory of Jesus." As bold and unbridled as I was in my sin, I've become far louder for the truth, for the Lover of my soul.

Portland Fellowship offered community when much of the church appeared dismissive and distant, or worse, advocating for my sin. In the TBG program, KathyGrace presented love and patience I needed when I tried to analyze things that only Jesus could unravel. She pushed me to be vulnerable in the context of community, with the depths of the soul changes Jesus was bringing forth. I'd never met anyone who knew the tedious facets of de-transitioning. KathyGrace brought encouragement in overwhelming moments as the world addressed me as a son, when my heart knew I am a daughter. Many have endured the trenches with me these past several years. Now, I'd die for the church I once persecuted. I pray you're encouraged by what Jesus has done within my life. He can and will do the same for you.
